How Can I Give? Part 2

Part 2: Maybe Donating From Your IRA Is A Good Idea

In my newsletter article last month, I said that the "joy of giving" happens when we actually give. I also suggested how to enjoy contributing to the church, starting with giving cash in the offering plate during our in-person Sunday morning worship. This month and next, I want to consider other ways of giving your tithe or offering. Your giving to the church might also lessen your tax burden. Maybe there's joy there, too!

While preparing my own tax return recently, I thought that you might like to know how your giving might reduce your income tax obligation. First, though, and important disclaimer: this article is NOT intended as tax advice. This is merely some information that I've learned through the years as a pastor and (for a short while) as an executive director of a small secular nonprofit organization. Maybe you will find this information helpful when you talk with your accountant or tax preparer in filing your own return.

It's likely that you already know that your contributions to the church or (any other 501(c)3 organization) are tax deductible. Both you and the church keep a record of your giving, and, in January of each year you receive a record from the church detailing your gifts in the previous year. These records form the basis for filing one part of Schedule A (Itemized Deductions) as part of your yearly tax return. However, since the amount of the standard deduction was raised a few years ago, most taxpayers now find that there is no advantage to their itemizing using Schedule A.

But there's another way to legally deduct your contribution to the church, whether you use Schedule A for itemizing deductions or not. Here's what you might consider: (a) if you have an Individual Retirement Account (IRA); and (b) if you are old enough to begin making IRA withdrawals without an early withdrawal penalty.

And NOTE this: You may make charitable contributions through your IRA in a way that will allow you to deduct the amount of the contributions from your taxable income. Doing so reduces your taxable income on the first page of Form 1040. To do this, you instruct the institution holding your IRA to make the withdrawal on your behalf, with the withdrawal check made out to the church, not to you.


Remember, if, like me, you are over 73 years old, you are required to make yearly withdrawals from your IRA. These Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs) are just that: required. You must either withdraw the RMD each year or pay a penalty. So, remember, if your IRA withdrawal comes as a check to you, it is taxable; but if you give it directly to a charitable organization, it is a non-taxable withdrawal. In effect, it is a deduction, and may reduce your tax obligation. In my mind, that doubles the joy of my giving. Maybe it will for you, too!

Rev. Lynn Drake: A Heart Dedicated to Love and Service

Please tell us more about your journey and what retirement looks like for you so far

Rev. Lynn Drake: Having spent my early years on Tybee Island, when there were more residents than vacationers, I enjoyed the freedom of neighborhood life on the back river, school activities which included lots of outdoor experiences, lots of beach time, barefoot most always, and a vibrant welcoming church life.

I had imagination and curiosity, not able to sit still, loved crabbing, playing in the marsh and up in trees, swinging as high as possible on tree ropes, singing, reading, and the library. On Easter one year, I came home from church and went out to the long rope swing and thought about the exciting morning of celebration, and the idea of a God. I have always remembered how I felt swinging and thinking and looking at the beautiful azaleas in blossoms, and imagining all that was right with my world. This experience has been with me as it shaped the beginning of my love for God and assured me in my life's faith journey.





It would be my musical family and the church that gave me a musical life. I played piano in Sunday School and Church and clarinet in the Savannah Youth Orchestra. When I was in high school, I was able to play for church and take organ lessons. In undergraduate school, I majored in music and afterwards obtained a Master of Music degree. I was fortunate to study abroad as part of the American Institute of Musical Studies in Graz, Austria, for a summer during graduate school.

While in college I worked as a legal secretary for a firm downtown, and when my musical academic studies were completed, I taught school for three years at Savannah Country Day.

From an early age at church, I was drawn to worship not only for the music but by the sermon and the gracious pastors I was raised amidst. When I was about 11 years old, I told my uncle I would love to be a pastor like him, and he said "Well, I think you would be a fine minister's wife."

I was disappointed but I did not think on it again much until I was full time Minister of Music at Isle of Hope UMC and began thinking about seminary around 1989.

I began taking seminary courses from United Methodist Seminaries, to be consecrated as a Diaconal Minister of Music in the church. During this time, and inspired by various professors along the way, I began to long for further studies and became more concerned for the lack of women's voices and histories being heard in the church, and the lack of hands and voices serving in justice ministries such as civil rights, LGBTQ+ and more.

During the early 1990's, along with others at Isle of Hope, I began making such ministries part of church life. Through serving in at risk communities, food banks, women, children, and family shelters, along with the men shelters which were already part of the area. Mission trips to Mexico and across the USA. In 1994 and 1995, I became connected with Billy and Asbury Memorial through the Summer Arts Program, helping with music and other areas needed.

It was during this time I was considering leaving IOH to go full time to Emory Candler School of Theology in Atlanta. With the blessings of Billy and Asbury and Isle of Hope I was given a chance to serve at Asbury with a joint salary from both churches while I attended seminary. In January 1996, I resigned my position as Minister of Music at IOH and came on staff at Asbury where I served for five years. I was ordained an Elder in the church in June of 1997. In 2001, Asbury Memorial and Wesley Oak were able to employ a full-time pastor, and I was appointed to Wesley Oak. I will always give thanks for WO where I know they "raised me up," with wisdom and amazing grace and their witness to the power of love and hospitality.

My family, especially my parents, and my husband, were always offering support and encouragement in my time in seminary and all through my years as a pastor. They enabled me to do so many things in ministry. My parents cared for Jimmy and Julia while I attended Emory, and my siblings did as well with many other gifts of support. The United Methodist Women of Isle of Hope UMC, have stayed with me all the years since 1996, with their prayers, invitations to their events, and seminary support. Dr. Gail O'Day, New Testament and Preaching, and Dr. Diane Lobody, New Testament, were brilliant and challenging professors who gave me so many wonderful, exciting experiences of learning.

Reverend Allison Rhodes, was a shining example of a woman in ministry, and as my ordination mentor and friend, was an assuring presence, serious, a great sense of humor, and generous teacher.

I continue to be inspired as a part of the Wesley Oak and Asbury Memorial worshiping community of faith and the mutual longing of the congregation for the fruits of hospitality, generosity, spiritual practices, worship, risk taking mission and service. As pastor, I am most grateful for the Word and Table service every Sunday for the last 22 years at Wesley Oak. The communal experience of confession and pardon, sharing the great thanksgiving, and the going forth by the Spirit that "makes us one with Christ, one with each other, and one in ministry to all the world." I will ever encourage other pastors and church leaders to continue in a worshipping community that includes Word and Table, and to embrace the longing in each person for the fruits of hospitality, generosity, spiritual practices, worship, mission, and service.

Remembering the words in Esther 4: 14b, "who knows but that you have come to your royal (holy) position for such a time as this?" when facing the challenges of today in ministry. I am most grateful as well for such a time as retirement! Already, I have been enjoying not only some rest and relaxation, but more time with my family and hobbies I enjoy.



FORSYTH FARMER'S MARKET

Green Team members were up early on Saturday March 30 when we volunteered at Forsyth Farmers' Market beginning at 7:00 AM. When the market opened at 9:00 AM we strolled up and down the main promenade sampling some of the delicious food for sale and visiting vendors who specialize in organic and other alternative farming practices.

Forsyth Farmers' Market is a non-profit organization that was founded in 2009 by six women who came together with a common vision of a local food system that is good for the health of all people and the environment.

The first market was held on May 9th, 2009. FFM's main goal is to provide all members of the Savannah community a welcoming, inclusive place to purchase local food and address food access issues. All vendors must produce at least 75% of the products they sell. Forsyth Farmers Market was one of the first independent farmers' markets to allow shoppers to use SNAP benefits to purchase food and it has consistently had one of the highest SNAP sales in Georgia.





COME HELP IN THE GARDEN!




