Relationships and REV -elations from August Alderman

From one of the altars of an associate pastor; an associate pastor's desk.

As I write to you for the August newsletter, I sit at my desk – my other altar as I described to you in our July newsletter. This desk is another altar where I come to read, write, pray, and think. Here, you are often in my thoughts as well as the life of our church. Here, I wonder how you are, and how the church can better support you on your journey. I also come to this altar to check in with myself, to make plans for the days and to run them by God.

We are coming up on summer's end and we are approaching hurricane season. It is important to have a plan for preparation and evacuation if need be. We are about halfway through the Summer Preaching Series; I trust it is going well!

The future, the past, and the moment

I recently heard someone say on a television show that it is difficult for them to be excited about the future when they are barely holding onto the present. It got me to thinking about the past, the present, and the future and where I am in the middle of it all. I attempt to always be present in the moment. I shared in a sermon over at Wesley Oak Church that Dr. Pat Stewart was sharing some wisdom with me one afternoon about the holiness of the present and the gift of being aware of it. I am in the present. I confess, there are pieces of the past I love so deeply and cannot let go of - the memories of my Granny, and many of my family members who have gone on into the clouds of witnesses. Places that no longer exist. I drive by other places that used to be a part of my life where strangers now live. I remember. There are a good many lessons for me to learn from the past - and those lessons include a lot about love, faith and resilience.

I am in the present. I hold onto my awareness of the present through checking in with myself, enjoying "slow time," savoring the elements of each moment, deeply listening to you when you take time to share a story with me.

And I am excited about the future! I think of the way Jesus describes the realm of God's kin-dom to us when we consider how heaven is here and not here yet. Here – and also – not here yet. Heaven is a time. Heaven is a state we create. Heaven is the future that we can also experience now. Heaven is with God and God's way is the way of heaven we are working to reflect on earth.

I consider the future of the church. The future of the church will happen because of what we are doing today. Cultivating community. Nurturing our friendships. Inviting people to church and to church activities. Community is cultivated through consistency. Consistently showing up for community events. We are good at this at Asbury Memorial and Wesley Oak. I encourage you to consider creative ways to show up for each other.

Relationships Re-membering and Resiliency

Our church is built on relationships and community. We are built on the work of God's prophets and God's everyday people, the life and ministry of Jesus, the spirit of love, and the gifts of our imagination. The church has a memory, and we are re-membering each time we welcome a child of God onto the life of our church. I included a reference to this in a recent offering invitation. Rev. Claire, Jason and I went to hear Bishop William Barber preach in Charleston and he stated: "Jesus put the resiliency of remembrance into the liturgy of our lives when he said, 'do this in remembrance of me." Resiliency is a faith claim. We are resilient and we have the history of faith to back this claim up. It is not our memory alone - if we forget something of our faith story, our church family members can remind us. Will you remind each other? Will you remind me? I promise to remind you.





If you would like to remember or honor a loved one in this special way, we invite you to complete an order form and submit it to the church office. Forms are conveniently available both in the church narthex and the office.


The cost of \$250.00 goes directly towards the upkeep and maintenance of our beloved sanctuary, helping to preserve this sacred space for generations to come.






