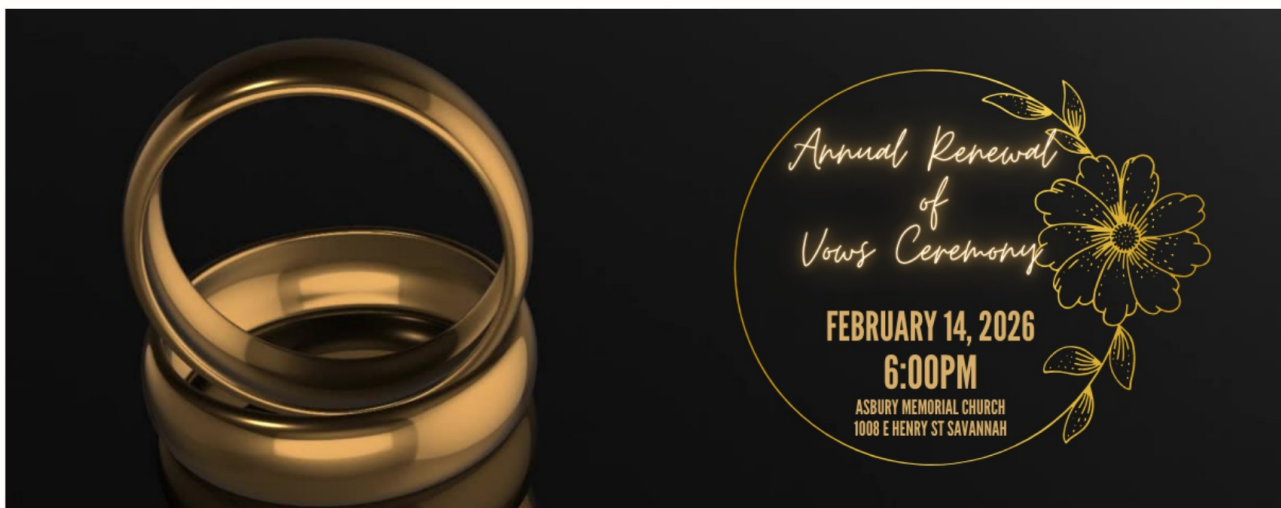

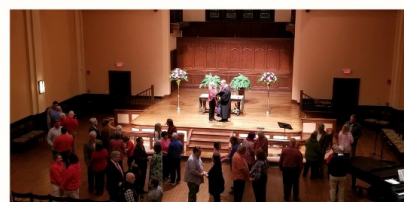
Renewing Love, Renewing Promise: An Annual Valentine's Tradition at Asbury

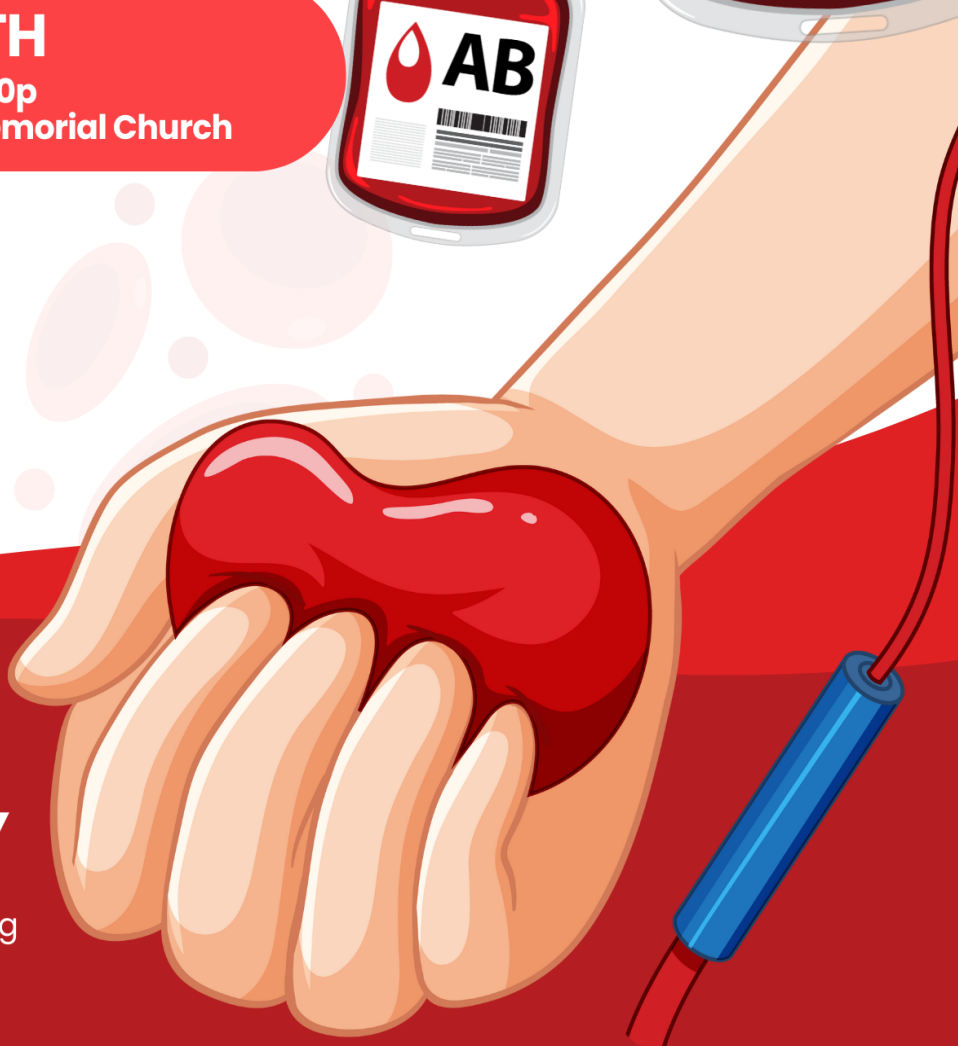

Q & A

WITH REV. AUGUST ALDERMAN



Associate Pastor Rev. August Alderman speaks with us about ministry, leadership, and life in the church.

Q

What has surprised you most about moving from seminary into ministry?

Thank you for these excellent and thoughtful questions Chris! I do not think anything about moving from seminary into congregational ministry has surprised me. However, it has become much more real to me – and I love the reality of it! I knew how much and how deeply I desired to be in ministry and, looking back, I can see all the ways I was preparing for ministry – especially beginning in 2020. At that time, I started thinking about going to seminary, while still doing hair, I began to operate my salon more like a church in my mind. I’ve always had a very active imagination – and I began to see the salon like a church. The salon brought people together, helped them to feel good, they had a place to talk, to express themselves, to be safe and to feel welcome. In my mind, the salon wasn’t far off from what church brings into our lives. So, I started “playing church.” I began to think more like how I imagined a pastor to think.

Q

In what ways have these first months affirmed or reshaped your sense of call?

I have felt affirmed in my call to ministry in the ways that I feel the support and encouragement of you, our church family! My ideas for ministry endeavors and outreach have been embraced and enhanced by critical thought and feedback from church staff, the staff relations committee, ministry roundtable, and one-on-one conversations with our church and community members. I think my call has been shaped and more defined by recent experiences with United Way, J.U.S.T., Family Promise, our 3rd space gatherings, and deepening relationships within the church community. I have felt affirmation in my role, especially by people outside of the church in the community who have embraced the change that commencement and ordination made in my life. People who do not go to church seem to reverently recognize that something is different with me. Isn’t that interesting!?

Q

What have you learned in parish ministry that couldn’t be taught in the classroom?

I did not have a property management course in seminary! Chicago Theological Seminary did offer courses related to properties, but they were based on the United Church of Christ operations. I did not take the course because it was UCC – and we are not, but now, I wish I had anyway. I am learning more about how much work, time, resources, and energy go into caring for church buildings and properties.



Q

How would you describe Asbury Memorial Church to someone encountering this community for the first time?

I describe Asbury Memorial Church simply as a loving and creative community to visitors and to inquiring minds! I think it's important to share that faith-with-questions is welcome because faith does not mean the absence of questions. For myself and my own faith identity, I describe myself as a child of God first and as a hopeful follower of the way of Jesus.



Q

Where are you seeing God show up in unexpected ways?

I am finding God's peaceful presence in late-night prayers and my-heart-to-the-heart-of-God middle of the night prayers. I find my awareness of God increases when I am in our sanctuary in a moment of silence. I find God in savoring moments with others, in learning about people's stories and loves, and learning how others sense God's movements. I sense God in stillness.



Q

What excites you most as you look toward the months ahead?

In the months ahead, I am excited to continue to grow our 3rd space ministry as an outreach ministry. I am excited for us to come up with new ideas for 3rd space activities! I am very excited to grow as a minister and as a preacher as the months go by. I feel butterflies when I think of all the ways our church can continue to grow into our community and our neighborhood! I am really looking forward to our upcoming "Church Talks." Thank you to everyone who has already said "yes" to the church talks, and for those who are already offering to open their homes to this! We haven't even officially gotten started yet!

Q

Outside of ministry, what helps you recharge or brings you joy?

Outside of ministry, analog experiences bring me joy! I love to listen to music on vinyl records, lay around on the floor with our cats Esther and Daniel, enjoy free time with Jason, go for intentional walks, read, and write! I also love to take pictures and try different filters on them on my phone, and I love to set up displays around the house and create scenes and altars.

An Evening with Author **Nico Lang**

In a time marked by cultural change, difficult conversations, and deep questions about identity and belonging, storytelling remains one of the most powerful tools we have. On Tuesday, February 11 at 6:30 p.m., Asbury Memorial Church will host an Author Reading and Q&A featuring acclaimed journalist and author Nico Lang, centered on their groundbreaking book *American Teenager*.

Held at 1008 E. Henry Street in Savannah, this evening invites the community into a space of listening, learning, and honest dialogue—one rooted in compassion and curiosity rather than fear or division.

American Teenager explores the lives of transgender and gender-diverse young people across the United States, highlighting how they navigate family, school, faith, and community while facing widespread misunderstanding and hostility. Through immersive reporting and deeply personal stories, Lang introduces readers to teens who are building meaningful lives—even in turbulent times. The result is a portrait of young people who are not defined by controversy, but by courage, humor, love, and determination.

Nico Lang is widely respected for their compassionate approach to journalism and for elevating voices that are often ignored or misrepresented. During the evening at Asbury Memorial, Lang will share selected readings from *American Teenager*, offering insight into the people and experiences that shaped the book.

The event will also include a Q&A session, giving attendees the opportunity to ask questions, reflect, and engage in thoughtful conversation. Whether participants come with deep familiarity or are just beginning to explore these topics, the format encourages respectful dialogue and shared learning.

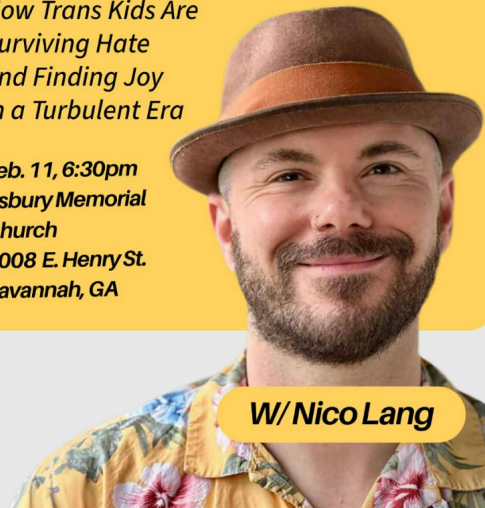

Journeying into Celtic Spirituality: An Online Study with Rev. Rodney Newman

In a world that often feels hurried, noisy, and disconnected, many people are longing for a spirituality that feels rooted, reflective, and deeply present. This March, participants are invited to slow down and rediscover a rich spiritual tradition through an Online Study on Celtic Spirituality led by author, scholar, and minister Rev. Rodney Newman.

This online gathering on the first four Mondays in March (March 2, 9, 16, and 23) at 6:30 p.m. offers a meaningful opportunity to explore the ancient wisdom of Celtic Christianity and its relevance to modern faith and daily living.

What Is Celtic Spirituality? Celtic spirituality is a Christian tradition that developed among early Christians in Ireland, Scotland, and parts of Britain. It is known for its deep awareness of God's presence in everyday life, a reverence for creation, and an understanding of faith as something lived, not just believed. Rather than separating the sacred from the ordinary, Celtic Christians recognized holy ground everywhere: in work and rest, prayer and hospitality, nature and community. Their spirituality emphasized rhythm, balance, and attentiveness to God's movement in the world around them—values that feel especially meaningful today.

This study invites participants to explore those themes and reflect on how Celtic spirituality can inform prayer, discipleship, and spiritual growth in the present day.

Rev. Rodney Newman brings a unique blend of scholarship, pastoral experience, and storytelling to this study. As both an author and minister, he is known for making historical and theological ideas accessible, engaging, and deeply relevant. Participants will be guided through key themes of Celtic Christian life and practice, drawing from history, scripture, and lived experience. The sessions are designed to be thoughtful and inviting rather than academic or overwhelming. Whether you are new to Celtic spirituality or already familiar with it, the study offers space for curiosity, reflection, and meaningful conversation.

What to Expect from the Study

Each session will focus on a different aspect of Celtic spirituality, such as:

- The idea of “thin places,” where the presence of God feels especially close
- The integration of faith into daily life and work
- The Celtic understanding of community, hospitality, and pilgrimage
- Spiritual practices that nurture awareness, gratitude, and balance

Because the study is held online, participants can join from the comfort of home while still experiencing connection and shared learning with others. The format allows time for reflection, discussion, and thoughtful engagement rather than rushed lectures.

No Book Required! It is available, if you wish. The sessions are fully accessible on their own, and all are welcome regardless of background or prior knowledge. However, for those who wish to go deeper, Rev. Newman's book *Journeys of Celtic Christians: A Participant Guide* is available and can serve as a helpful companion to the study. The book can be found through Amazon and provides additional reflections and insights that enrich the experience.

In uncertain times, many people are searching for a faith that feels grounded, hopeful, and connected—to God, to others, and to the world itself. Celtic spirituality offers a gentle but profound reminder that God is not distant or confined to specific moments, but present in the ordinary rhythms of life. This online study is more than a class; it is an invitation to pause, reflect, and journey inward while learning from an ancient tradition that still speaks powerfully today.

Whether you are seeking spiritual renewal, deeper understanding, or simply a quieter way to engage your faith, this four-week journey offers a meaningful place to begin.

Join us online on Monday evenings in March at 6:30 p.m. and discover how the wisdom of Celtic Christianity can inspire and shape your spiritual life today.





GREEN TEAM

CARING FOR CREATION IN THE WINTER MONTHS

As the days grow shorter and the temperatures dip, winter invites us to slow down, gather close, and be mindful of how we use energy in our homes and shared spaces. Caring for creation doesn't take a season off—and winter offers plenty of opportunities to live more sustainably while also saving money and staying comfortable.

One of the simplest places to start is heat wisely. Turning your thermostat down just one or two degrees can significantly reduce energy use. Many of us are surprised how comfortable we remain with a sweater, cozy socks, or a blanket nearby. At night, lowering the thermostat even more—and piling on quilts—can make a real difference.



Seal the leaks. Drafty windows and doors are a major source of heat loss. Simple fixes like weatherstripping, draft blockers, or even rolled towels along door bottoms can keep warm air inside where it belongs. On sunny winter days, open curtains to let natural light and warmth in; close them at night to help insulate your space.

Be mindful of electricity. Winter often means more time indoors, more lights on, and more devices plugged in. Switching to LED bulbs, turning off lights when leaving a room, and unplugging electronics when not in use are small acts that add up. If you decorate for the season, consider using timers so lights aren't running all night.

Use hot water thoughtfully. Shorter showers, washing clothes in cold water, and only running the dishwasher when full all help reduce energy use. If you have a water heater, setting it to a moderate temperature can also save energy without sacrificing comfort.

Finally, remember that community matters. Sharing rides to church events, checking in on neighbors during cold snaps, and supporting those who may struggle with heating costs are all part of faithful, earth-honoring living.

As people of faith, we believe creation is not something to use up, but something to care for and cherish. This winter, may our choices—large and small—reflect love for our neighbors, future generations, and the beautiful world God has entrusted to us.

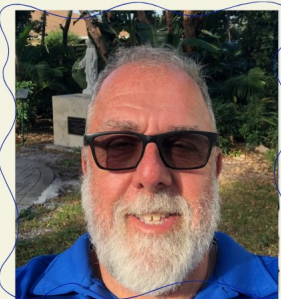

America's Four Gods: What We Say About God, & What That Says About Us

February Wisdom Seekers Discussion | February 9

On February 9, Wisdom Seekers will explore America's Four Gods by sociologists Paul Froese and Christopher Bader. The book invites us to look beyond religious labels and reflect on how our image of God shapes our values, relationships, and interactions with others.

Froese and Bader suggest that most Americans' beliefs about God fall into four broad views:

- Authoritarian God – actively involved and quick to judge, emphasizing rules and order.
- Benevolent God – actively involved and loving, emphasizing compassion and care for others.
- Critical God – judgmental but less involved in daily life, emphasizing moral accountability.
- Distant God – neither very involved nor judgmental, emphasizing personal responsibility.

These differing views help explain why people who share religious language may still see the world very differently. Understanding this can deepen empathy, reduce conflict, and invite more meaningful conversations across differences.

You do not need to read the book to participate—provided articles offer a helpful overview for discussion. Join us as we reflect on which images of God resonate with us and how this awareness might shape the way we engage one another with curiosity, grace, and wisdom.

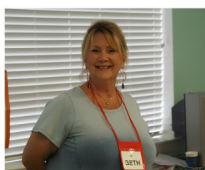



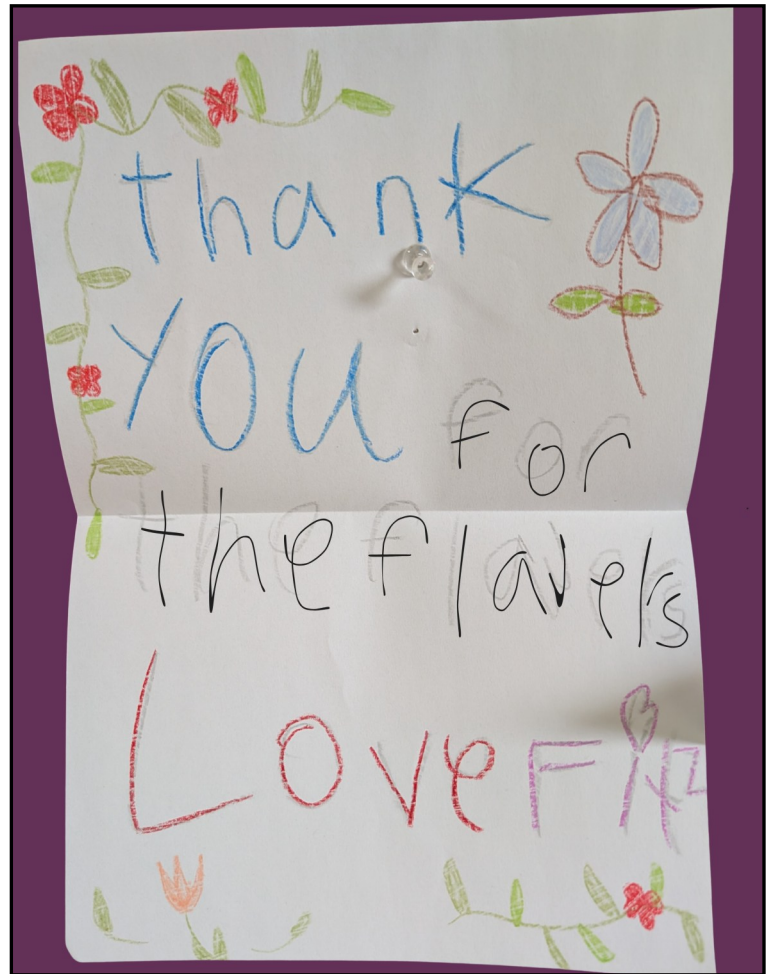


SUPPORT FOR A BALANCED LIFE

Wesley Oak Church is proud to host SMART Recovery meetings every Monday evening from 7:00–8:30 p.m. SMART Recovery is a program designed to help individuals overcome harmful habits and addictions through practical tools based on cognitive and motivational psychology and addiction research.

Unlike traditional 12-step programs, SMART takes a science-based approach that emphasizes self-reliance, self-resilience, and self-empowerment. Participants are encouraged to become the experts on their own recovery journeys, choosing strategies and supports that fit their needs. Topics may include relationships, substance use, gambling, eating, spending, and other behaviors that can impact well-being.

There is no requirement to commit to a lifetime of meetings. Instead, participants decide when and how long they wish to be involved, making SMART a flexible and welcoming community. The program also recognizes that individuals may benefit from participating in more than one support group, and it values collaboration rather than exclusivity.

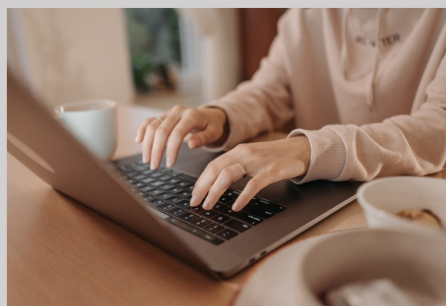

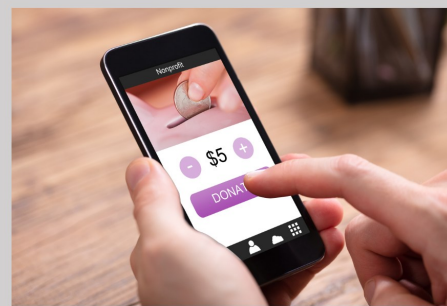
