Sermonette on Christmas story

From the Associate's Desk of Rev. Claire Marich:

I hope that you all enjoyed the many wonders of Christmas! This Christmas, once again we had to be creative in our celebrations. As we think of pre-pandemic Christmases past and future, many of us missed large gatherings, in-person shopping, and food-laden tables trading them instead for a scaled-back version of Christmas festivities. But this does not mean that we scale back our joy. Emmanuel has arrived! And I need to feel that God is with us as much as I ever have.

Christmas can be confusing theologically. I hear some preach that the greatest gift of all is Jesus and his sacrifice. I hear Jesus referred to as Christ, the risen Lord. These are such important parts of our Christian identity but they are really postscripts to the life of Jesus! They are not part of the Christmas story for me. Too often we jump to the end of the story without savoring the beginning.

I love Advent because of its anticipation of the joy of the birth of Jesus, the baby who came to earth embodied like you and me to show us how live fully as human beings. I wait in hopes of learning just a little more about what it means to live faithfully because Jesus shows us and tells us. This is the beginning of our story. Christmas to me is about Jesus the man. While we are not divine, but human, Jesus in all of his humanity from inauspicious beginnings, throughout his ministry to his death, gives us examples through words and actions of how to live in communion with God. I grapple with the living part so Jesus the man is very helpful and instructive to me.

Every time a baby comes into my circle, I think of the birth of Jesus and wonder what gifts this child will bring to the world. Maybe they will have a tender heart, or a burning passion for nature and the environment, or the gift of teaching the faith or encouragement. Because Jesus came as a baby all things are possible for that baby and for each of us as we grow in faith. God is with us! God knows our human toiling, our great joys and our deepest pain. And God is with us. This is the beginning of our story, full of hope and peace and possibility. What were you hoping for when you were anticipating Christmas?

Friends, these are hard financial times for some in the Asbury community.

An 'Asbury Emergency Funding Task Force' was created to help ensure no Asburian lost their home due to the pandemic.

We were thinking of and praying for you while we worked!

Please do not let pride stop you from applying to see if there might be some financial assistance available to help you through these difficult times.

Time may be running out to apply for some of these grants!

If you need financial help with your rent, mortgage, utilities and other things, please don't let pride stand in your way when there might be help just one application away.

Asbury has partnered with the experts at the non-profit Family Promise to help both individuals and families try to find financial resources that best fit your situation:

If you live in the city of Savannah, or Chatham, Effingham or Bryan county, there may be help for you through some emergency state, county and/or city grants. Again, time may be running out to apply for these grants! Do NOT delay in applying!

There is also a fund called the Asbury Community Cares Fund, given by Asburians *just* to help people in the Asbury community. This fund may be able to help you!

GLORIA and DALE MOSES

egistered nurse Gloria Moses served in the Air Force Nurse Corps from 1959 to 1964. Growing up in Savannah, Gloria's family knew hard financial times. Her mother worked whatever jobs she could find while raising three young daughters herself. After graduating from Savannah High School in 1947, Gloria boldly rook a bus to Augusta, where a scholarship enabled her to attend the Barrett School of Nursing. Within three years, Gloria was capped a registered nurse, and was employed by Augusta's University Hospital for the next two years.

Then, Gloria hir the road, visiting her sister at Offutt Air Force Base in Nebraska along the way. After Gloria returned to Savannah, she joined the Air Force Nurse Corps for a five-year enlistment. Promoted to first lieutenant, she was sent to Larson Air Force Base in Washington (the state), where she met her future husband, Dale.



It was a wonderful couple of years, as Gloria remembers the time in Japan. When not exploring the country, she and Dale lived off-base in a small house in a collection of rice fields.

When Dale retired from the military in 1962, the couple decided to try life on the

West Coast. Before they finished settling into their new home in Vacaville, California, Gloria became the office nurse for a local doctor, which led to an eventual position as director of a nursing home. Dale took a job with the California Department of Corrections as a prison guard at Solana State Prison.

led to two, which led to five. After 10 years. Dale sold his trucking company and considered his next move.

In 1993, Gloria and Dale retired and moved to Savannah, living on Wilmington Island until Dale's death in 2002 at age 85. Now 92, Gloria lives comfortably in a local retirement home. Age does nothing to diminish her many memories of her adventures living in Washington, Japan. California, Arkansas, and, ultimately, right here Dale.

As Gloria recalls with obvious fondness and pride, "He was a wonderful husband and a driven entrepreneur."

Asbury 's Stephen Ministry

At the end of February 2022 Asbury's first class of Stephen
Ministers (lay people trained to provide one-to-one care to those
in need) complete their training and will be commissioned in
March to begin our lay caregiving Stephen Ministry...Thank you
for committing to this mission August Alderman, Mary Ann
Barnes, Barbara Gooby and Kimmi Sampieri.

The pastors and laypeople trained by Stephen Ministries to direct Asbury's Stephen Ministry are Stephen Leaders. Stephen Leaders are the ones who oversee and direct our Stephen Ministers. They recruit, select, train, organize and supervise our

Stephen Ministers, identify people in need of care, and match them with a Stephen Minister. Our Stephen Leaders are Candace Jenkins, Sandra Katz, Rhonda Reed and Stephen Reed.

Those who receive the care of Stephen Ministers are referred to as care receivers. Possible care receivers are people from our congregation or community who are experiencing divorce, grief, loss of a job, loneliness, hospitalization, terminal illness, or any number of other life difficulties.

Stephen Ministers are not counselors. They are trained Christian caregivers. Their role is to listen and care—not counsel or advise. Please do not refer to them as counselors.

Stephen Ministry is a supervised ministry. Stephen Ministers engage in twice-monthly supervision to ensure that they are providing the best-quality Christian care.

Stephen Ministry is a confidential ministry. What a care receiver tells a Stephen Minister remains confidential. Even in supervision, the names of care receivers and specific details are never discussed.

Stephen Ministers do not make cold calls. They are assigned only to people who agree to receive the care of a Stephen Minister.
