Notes from the Home Office Rev. Claire Marich June, 2020

'I wish it need not have happened in my time,' said Frodo. 'So do I,' said Gandalf, 'and so do all who live to see such times. But that is not for them to decide. All we have to decide is what to do with the time that is given us.'

I do not know how many Lord of the Rings fans are among us, but this thought seems fitting for the moment. Bishop Sally Dyck reminds us that it was hard to provide leadership—clergy or laity—in the church before the coronavirus pandemic. It's really hard now! I offer this quote because it's tempting to wish we didn't have to live through this difficult time, much less be disciples in it. There are many days that I just want to unplug from the world around me and hug my pillow or work in the garden instead. But then I think about what Gandalf says to Frodo to encourage and also to motivate him: our task is to decide what to do with the time that has been given to us.

It's okay to nap. It's okay to garden or run or paint or read or watch tv. But we also need to be in community. For me, that means calling folks who are on my mind, for checking on my family, for planning for the present and the future of our congregation, and for making a difference when I see a need. Every day I hear your stories of the many ways that you are staying in community and making a difference in the lives around you.

In virtually meeting with Rev. Billy Hester and Mayor Van Johnson, we agree that there are two critical ways that everyone can be vital in this time we are given: we must vote and we must complete the 2020 Census.

On the heels of Memorial Day, it is a fitting tribute to our fallen veterans to exercise the right to vote. Absentee and early voting have already begun, with primary election day coming on Tuesday, June 9. The only way to have a government that represents our interests is to elect those good representatives! We pray for those who serve in office and those who are candidates.

The 2020 Census captures confidential data for each household that cannot be shared with any other entity including US Government agencies. The results of this census will determine many aspects of our local funding and representation for the NEXT TEN YEARS. We want our local people and our state to receive the resources that will directly impact our welfare and the quality of life in Savannah. The process is simple. One person per household fills out the brief and simple survey online. If you haven't gotten to do this yet, now is the time. Here is the link:

Pentecost

God said to Noah, "This (rainbow) is the sign of the covenant that I have established between me and all flesh that is on the earth." Genesis 9:17

The Jews at the time of Pentecost were celebrating the Feast of Weeks, a time 50 days after the first grain was harvested. The ancient harvest festival also became a day of renewing the Noahic covenant, which is established between God and "all flesh that is upon the earth." By this time, some Jews were already living in diaspora, unable to give offerings in the temple, but from near and far they gathered as the Holy Spirit blew in on wind and tongues of flame to touch and unite each of them in one understanding.

Our one understanding as people of faith, as Christians and as Methodists is that there is no justice when one person is treated unjustly. We stand for the dignity of all people, racial justice, criminal justice reform, civil rights, human rights, eradicating poverty, gun violence prevention, economic justice, education for all, LGBTQ+ rights and peace through justice to name a few.

The murder of **George Floyd** is an assault to all of humanity, a cruel and unfair reality to his family, and an ongoing terror to his African-American siblings.

Racism and hatred are killing our citizens, stripping children of their innocence, corrupting our moral dignity and rotting our society in the United States from the inside out. It takes recording these horrors to make them a problem for perpetrators of threats and murder who are stuck in a chattel mentality of white supremacy. What about all the crimes that go unrecorded?

We must refuse and resist racism at every turn. Last week, Billy and I emplored you to vote, but you must do more than this. You must know who you are voting for and for what they stand. Are the people you are electing ready to propose and support Hate Crime legislation? Reasonable gun reform? Georgia and South Carolina are two of only four states in the nation that have no hate crime legislation that cover certain crimes committed on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, or disability and increase the consequences for perpetrators. Interestingly enough, the three Southern holdouts, Georgia, South Carolina and Arkansas are all held up on whether LGBTQ+ rights should be covered. Well, we know they should.

It is time for white people to join our brown-skinned siblings in organizing for reform. All folks are in a different spot when it comes to recognizing institutionalized racism on our anti-racist journey. A Home Repair Project Showed Me How Much I Still Had to Learn About My Dad

Working on a home repair project with my father showed me I had more to learn about him than I thought.

Growing up, I understood one thing about my dad: He knew everything. This was our relationship, in sum: I asked him questions and he told me the answers. Is there really a man in the moon? How do sailboats work? What is the highest score anyone's ever gotten in Pac-Man?

In my teen years, he taught me things I'd need to know to survive in the real world. How to drive a stick shift. How to check your car tire's pressure (though the gauge he bought me 20 years ago still sits untouched in my glove box). The correct knife to use to cut a cantaloupe.

When I moved out on my own, I called him at least once a week, usually when something broke in my apartment and I needed to know how to fix it: the toilet; the air-conditioning; the wall, once, when I threw a shoe at a terrifying spider.

But then, eventually, I needed him less. I got married, and my husband had most of the knowledge I lacked about gutter cleaning and water heaters and nondestructive insect removal. For everything else, we had Google.

I don't know when it happened, but our conversations when I called devolved into six words. Me: "Hi, Dad." Him: "Hi, sweets. Here's Mom." (Because her, I still needed—What's your chicken parm recipe? Do I need to call the doctor for my daughter's fever? Can you read this draft of my novel?)

MAYBE IT'S JUST THAT I'VE SPENT MY LIFE ASKING HIM THE WRONG QUESTIONS.

I loved my dad, of course, but I wondered at times if maybe he had already shared everything I needed to know. Maybe I'd heard all his stories. Maybe, after knowing a man for 40 years, there's nothing left to say.

Then, this past summer, my husband, our four kids, and I moved in with my parents for three weeks while our house was being renovated. They own a lake house, and Dad asked me to help him rebuild the bulkhead at their dock.

I didn't balk—it was the least I could do for free rent—but I was dreading it. It was hard, manual labor. We got wet and sandy, and I'm fairly certain a deadly bacteria was unleashed from the innards of the rotted wood we hacked away from the old retaining wall.

But as we put the new bulkhead together piece by piece, my dad knowing exactly what went where, I looked at him. "How do you know how to build a bulkhead?"

The heavy mallet he was swinging paused in midair. "I spent a summer in college building them on the Jersey Shore."

"You did?" I thought I knew everything about my dad—all his random jobs. I knew about the apple orchard, the summer at the horseradish manufacturing plant that burned his hands raw, and even the diner line-cook position, where he learned how to make the best omelet in the Western hemisphere. But I never knew this.

"Yep. Now come up here and let me teach you how to use this circular saw."

As he explained the importance of not setting the blade too deep (information I quickly tucked away in the same place I store the information about how to use the tire gauge), I realized that maybe it's not that there's nothing left to say. Maybe it's just that I've spent my life asking him the wrong questions.

A few weeks later, after my family and I moved back into our renovated house, I called my parents. Dad answered. "Hi, sweets," he said.

"Here's Mom."

"Wait, Dad," I said. "How are you?" We ended up talking about the consulting gig he was working on, a new battery he'd bought for his sailboat, a refi my husband and I were looking into to bundle our home-renovation loan. Nothing life-changing, nothing earth-shattering. To anyone else, it would sound like a normal conversation between a dad and his daughter.

But to me, it was novel. A new beginning. I spent the first part of my life needing to talk to my dad. Now I talk to him because I want to.

Dear Aiden,



Savannah artist brings fantasy, charm to walls, windows and other items with decorative paintings

One local artist is practicing social distancing with her art, while bringing a historic medium to Savannahian's garages and doorways.

Janie Atkinson is a decorative artist who hand paints fantastical images on walls and windows, creating staircases and gardens where once there was blank space. During the coronavirus, while many residents have been sheltered at home, her unique artistry has risen in demand as she creates new worlds on familiar spaces residents see each day.

Her art has roots in the French artistic tradition known as Trompe l'oeil, which translates literally to "deceive the eye." The unique painting style is an artistic technique which uses realistic imagery to create optical illusions of objects in three dimensions on a flat surface such as a wall, window or door.

Atkinson is able to transform common patio floors into intricate Roman tiles; garage doors into dense forest landscapes and kitchen drawers into lush depictions of fruit and wines.

"You're really only limited by your imagination," Atkinson shared. "A lot of it is very practical – creating portable screens or panels to beautify appliances and unused doors."

The roots of American decorative painting stretch back to colonial days when settlers who could not afford the expensive wallpapers and paintings of Europe hired local artists to hand paint walls and exteriors of their homes with imaginative murals and designs.

Atkinson herself first started honing her craft in the early 1990s in Charleston, working on historic homes to replicate hand painted wallpapers and murals dating back hundreds of years.

"It's like a fine art portal to the past," Atkinson shared. "It's something that says magical murals, and enhances the designs of a home. It's a very old art form."

All of her work is commissioned by her customers. Her works have included intricate tile patterns on flooring, hand-painted windows on interior walls looking onto lush gardens and paintings which transform dull refrigerators into the shelves of a greenhouse, with vibrant plants and flowers. Beyond interior design painting, Atkinson also commissions portraits. Many of her customers request paintings of their loved ones or a favorite pet. "Something personal - maybe grandchildren at the beach or a beloved pet, they are great personalized gifts during this time that can become a keepsake," she added.

Atkinson says she enjoys the challenge of seeing a new space and trying to imagine the possibilities that her art can create for it.

Once she sees a space in a home, Atkinson works with the residents to come up with a fun and creative way to transform the area into something from another place and time.

"It's always a great topic of conversation," Atkinson shared. "We take it outside and look at their doors and garages and make it look like you are going into another room. The possibilities are endless."
